

ABOUT FLYERS POWERPLAY

The Philadelphia Flyers PowerPlay, a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organization, is a power wheelchair floor hockey team based in the Philadelphia metropolitan area. Power wheelchair floor hockey, more commonly known as Powerhockey, is played by people who use power wheelchairs in their everyday lives.

The team was started by our founder, Pat Hilferty, as a school activity in 1999. Upon his graduation, Pat wanted to formally organize. The Philadelphia PowerPlay was born in September of 2003. Pat's passion project celebrates its 20th anniversary in the 2023-2024 season.

The Flyers PowerPlay is open to competent power wheelchair users of all genders, 10 years and older. Our team is made up of about 25 players with various disabilities, including but not limited to Muscular Dystrophy, Cerebral Palsy, and Spinal Cord Injuries. The team plays twice a month, September through June, and provides an outlet for members to play hockey and

get their competitive juices flowing. It also allows for players, family members, and friends to socialize in an atmosphere of acceptance and gain a network of support.

Although Pat passed away in May of 2017 from complications due to his Muscular Dystrophy, his vision and memory lives on in each and every player who joins the Flyers PowerPlay family. Over the years, the team established an on-going relationship with the Philadelphia Flyers of the NHL. In 2017, the Flyers adopted the PowerPlay as the first powerhockey team to partner with an NHL franchise. We continue to encourage NHL teams to reach out to their respective disabled communities to spread the message and grow the sport of powerhockey.

The Flyers PowerPlay also competes internationally, winning the US Powerhockey championship in 2013, the Powerhockey Cup in 2018, and the Canada Cup in 2019, where they faced the best Powerhockey teams in North America.



ABOUT POWERHOCKEY

Powerhockey is wheelchair floor hockey specifically for people requiring the use of a power wheelchair in their daily lives. Powerhockey is commonly played on a basketball court with modified lightweight sticks and a wiffle ball substituted for a puck. The primary source of strength and speed involved in the sport comes from the power wheelchair. Powerhockey is for participants of all genders and skill levels, 10 years and older.

OUR MISSION AND IMPACT
